

### **NOTE 1 — DETERMINING MAXIMUM RATINGS**

Reverse power dissipation and the possibility of thermal runaway must be considered when operating this rectifier at reverse voltages above 0.1 VRWM. Proper derating may be accomplished by use of equation (1).

TA(max) = TJ(max)  $R\theta JAPF(AV)$   $R\theta JAPR(AV)$  (1) where

TA(max) = Maximum allowable ambient temperature

TJ(max) = Maximum allowable junction temperature (125°C or the temperature at which thermal runaway occurs, whichever is lowest)

PF(AV) = Average forward power dissipation

PR(AV) = Average reverse power dissipation

 $R\theta JA = Junction-to-ambient thermal resistance$ 

Figures 1, 2, and 3 permit easier use of equation (1) by taking reverse power dissipation and thermal runaway into consideration. The figures solve for a reference temperature as determined by equation (2).

$$TR = TJ(max)$$
  $R\theta JAPR(AV)$  (2)

Substituting equation (2) into equation (1) yields:

$$TA(max) = TR \quad R\theta JAPF(AV)$$

Inspection of equations (2) and (3) reveals that  $T_R$  is the ambient temperature at which thermal runaway occurs or where  $T_J = 125\,^{\circ}\text{C}$ , when forward power is zero. The transition from one boundary condition to the other is evident on the curves of Figures 1, 2, and 3 as a difference in the rate of change of the slope in the vicinity of 115 $^{\circ}\text{C}$ .

The data of Figures 1, 2, and 3 is based upon dc conditions. For use in common rectifier circuits, Table 1 indicates suggested factors for an equivalent dc voltage to use for conservative design, that is:

$$VR(equiv) = V(FM)$$
 F (4)

The factor F is derived by considering the properties of the various rectifier circuits and the reverse characteristics of Schottky diodes.

EXAMPLE: Find TA(max) for 1N5821 operated in a 12–volt dc supply using a bridge circuit with capacitive filter such that  $I_{DC} = 2.0$  A

(IF(AV) = 1.0 A), I(FM)/I(AV) = 10, Input Voltage = 10 V(rms),  $R\theta JA = 40^{\circ}C/W$ .

Step 1. Find VR(equiv). Read F = 0.65 from Table 1, VR(equiv)  
= 
$$(1.41) (10) (0.65) = 9.2 \text{ V}.$$

Step 2. Find TR from Figure 2. Read TR =  $108^{\circ}$ C @ VR = 9.2 V and R $\theta$ JA =  $40^{\circ}$ C/W.

Step 3. Find PF(AV) from Figure 6. \*\*Read PF(AV) = 0.85 W

Step 4. Find TA(max) from equation (3).

$$TA(max) = 108$$
 (0.85) (40) = 74°C.





Figure 2. Maximum Reference Temperature 1N5821






Figure 3. Maximum Reference Temperature






Figure 5. Thermal Response

Use of the above model permits junction to lead thermal resistance for any mounting configuration to be found. For a given total lead length, lowest values occur when one side of the rectifier is brought as close as possible to the heat sink. Terms in the model signify:

TA = Ambient Temperature TC = Case Temperature

 $T_L = Lead Temperature$   $T_J = Junction Temperature$ 

 $R\theta S$  = Thermal Resistance, Heat Sink to Ambient

 $R\theta_L$  = Thermal Resistance, Lead to Heat Sink

 $R\theta J = Thermal Resistance, Junction to Case$ 

PD = Total Power Dissipation = PF + PR

PF = Forward Power Dissipation

PR = Reverse Power Dissipation








Figure 7. Typical Forward Voltage




Figure 10. Typical Capacitance

VR, REVERSE VOLTAGE (VOLTS)




Figure 8. Maximum Non-Repetitive Surge Current





Figure 9. Typical Reverse Current

### **NOTE 4 — HIGH FREQUENCY OPERATION**

Since current flow in a Schottky rectifier is the result of majority carrier conduction, it is not subject to junction diode forward and reverse recovery transients due to minority carrier injection and stored charge. Satisfactory circuit analysis work may be performed by using a model consisting of an ideal diode in parallel with a variable capacitance. (See Figure 11.)
